#### Montana Firewatch 2023 - Update as of August 4, 2023

The Colt Fire started 15 miles northwest of Seeley Lake on Monday, July 17, which was reportedly started by lightning. This fire as of August 4th was 7,179 acres in size with 23% containment. Firefighters have been working hard to

control the fire, which has increased due to higher temperatures and lower humidity.

On the fire's west side about 1 mile north of Sunset Peak a spot fire became very active yesterday afternoon.

The spot increased in size and moved in a southerly direction, crossing Forest Road 9570. East of Sunset Peak, retardant from aircraft was used to keep the fire in check and keep it from moving south.

Crews continued to construct handlines along the south side working to the west and staying north of the West Fork of the Clearwater River. On the east side, along Forest Road 646 (Colt/Uhler Road) engine crews continued to patrol, mop up, and increase containment. On the north side, crews shifted their focus to holding and mopping up as fire activity directly along the control lines diminished. Along the northwest side dozer lines and handlines continued to

be strengthened working both north and south of Beaver Lake. The Structure Protection Group patrolled the Highway 83 corridor and continued structure assessments and supply needs for the Lindbergh Lake area.

In the southwest corner of the fire personnel will be reevaluating the locations planned for indirect control line construction and adjusting those actions based on the where the spot fire moved. On the forest road systems west of the fire, heavy equipment and crews will work on linking roads and control lines together forming indirect control lines. Along the north side, east side (Forest Road 646),

# Keep Aquatic Invasive Species Prevention in Mind When Recreating on Water

HELENA – So far this year, FWP and its partners have inspected 66,000 watercraft for aquatic invasive species. Of those, 35 were musselfouled and more than 200 were found with aquatic weeds.

FWP and partner agencies, which include tribes, counties and conservation districts, operate more than 17 road-side watercraft inspection stations across the state. To find a watercraft inspection station or to learn more, go to CleanDrainDryMT.com or call the FWP Aquatic Invasive Species Bureau at 406-444-2440.

A July survey for Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) in Beaver Lake near Whitefish found no EWM. Another follow-up survey will be conducted later this month. Eradication of EWM is the goal for Beaver Lake through persistent survey and removal.

Eurasian watermilfoil in Nilan Reservoir (near Augusta) was treated with herbicide by FWP in 2022. Surveys conducted last month found no evidence of EWM in the lake. Nilan is the only location of EWM on the Rocky Mountain Front and EWM eradication is the

objective for that system.

All boaters and other water recreationists need to follow the rules to prevent aquatic invasive species from affecting Montana's waters.

Those rules include:

All boats must stop at all open watercraft inspection stations they encounter. Failure to do so could result in a fine of up to \$500.

Always be sure to clean, drain and dry your boat.

All watercraft entering Montana are required to be inspected for aquatic invasive species. An inspection is required before launching on Montana waters.

Non-residents transporting watercraft into Montana must purchase a Vessel AIS Prevention Pass before launching. The fee is \$30 for motorized and \$10 for nonmotorized watercraft. The pass is valid until Dec. 31.

Inspection is required for Montana residents before launch IF: the boat is entering the state, crossing west over the Continental Divide or entering the Flathead basin.

and southeast corner firefighters will continue to hold and mop up along the line. On the south side, and north of the West Fork of the Clearwater River, four crews will continue to build fire control line moving from east to west. These crews may camp closer to the line to decrease travel time.

Helicopters and airplanes will continue to be used to keep the fire checked up on the west side and southwest corner. The Lindbergh Group will continue structure assessments as well as look for indirect control line opportunities that would have the highest opportunity for success ahead of the fire. A night shift of engines will patrol and monitor fire conditions.

If conditions rapidly change an Evacuation Order may be issued with no prior notice or warning. Home and property owners in the surrounding area should remain vigilant and prepared. Have an evacuation plan for family, pets, and livestock; sign up for emergency alerts at Smart911.com; be familiar with the Missoula County evacuation process and what an order and warning means.

Remember that temporary flight restrictions also apply to unmanned aircraft systems (UAS) or drones. A drone incursion occurred on exit the Continental Divide Friday, July 21. Fire managers would like to remind the public that when you fly, they can't. It is also now a criminal misdemeanor in Montana to fly drones that interfere with fire suppression efforts – with a fine up to \$1,500 and the violator has the potential to be charged with firefighting costs.

If you are evacuated due to the Colt Fire and need shelter, please call the Red Cross at (406) 215-1514.

Other fires in the area include Rogers Pass fire, which started on the afternoon of August 1st south of Highway 200 and the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail. Aviation resources, crews, and heavy equipment from Montana DNRC and the Forest Service are working on the fire with additional resources on order. This fire as of August 4th was 46 acres in size and 25% contained. Thru hikers are advised to exit the Continental Divide Trail at Flesher Pass and reconnect at Roger's Pass.

Bowles Creek fire started following a lightning storm on the evening of July 20, 2023. Ground resources and an early morning helicopter flight on July 21st estimated the Bowles Fire to be approximately 50 acres and the Daly Creek fire on the Bitterroot side of the divide to be approximately 1-2 acres.

The fire is located approximately three miles southwest of Skalkaho Pass in the Sapphire Wilderness Study Area (WSA) in steep terrain. As of August 4th, this fire was 3,267 acres and 3% contained.


Sidney Fire started August 1st approximately 7-8 miles south of Highway 2 and 2.5 miles west from the Badger Cabin admin site. This fire as of August 4th was 100 acres and 0% contained.
